PREFACE

Stewardship is not merely an assignment; it is a reflection of the heart and mind of the Most High. Section V — Walking in Charity, Not Performance

True charity is sacrificial and selfless, not driven by need for recognition. It is the heart of the steward who serves not for applause but for the joy of pleasing the Father.

Final Movement — Stewardship Until the King Returns

We are not merely waiting for Christ to return. We are called to steward our lives, resources, and hearts, knowing that our faithful service is the only thing that will endure.

OPENING SEAL — The Weight of What Was Given

You were not awakened to impress men.
You were not chosen to build a platform.
You were not set apart to play with what is holy.
You were pulled from darkness
because something was placed in your hands—
and the Father will require it of you.
You cannot unsee what He revealed.
You cannot unknow what He whispered.
You cannot return the mantle,
because it was never signed in ink...
It was signed in blood.
So now you walk with something others don't see.
And that something will judge your walk,

before it judges the world.

This is not a scroll about success.

This is about sacred trust.

If you treat sacred things casually,
you will turn holy ground into quicksand.

And the fire that once anointed you
will become the fire that exposes you.

Let this be clear:

The scroll you carry is not yours.

The breath you speak with is not yours.

The knowledge you hold is not yours.

The path you walk is not yours.

It was given.

It was measured.

It was entrusted.

You are a steward—

And the first requirement of a steward
is not ability...

but faithfulness.

“Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.”

— 1 Corinthians 4:2

This faithfulness is not loud.

It does not look like success.

It does not seek applause.

It obeys in silence.

This is why the Kingdom is never advanced

by the most talented,

but by the most surrendered.

“God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise...

that no flesh should glory in his presence.”

— 1 Corinthians 1:27–29

So now we begin here:

Before the work, before the gift, before the calling...

we remember the weight.

Because the one who does not feel the weight

cannot walk worthy of the work.

SECTION I — Weight Before Work (Expanded)

Before the Father sends,

He weighs.

Before the Spirit speaks,

She waits.

And before the Son commissions,

He confirms the vessel can carry what He's about to give.

“Be still, and know that I am God...”

— Psalm 46:10

But men run ahead.

They take knowledge and turn it into performance.

They take revelation and make it branding.

They grab what is holy

and market it before they've been mastered by it.

But the fire does not anoint arrogance.

It burns it.

And the Spirit does not fill busy hands.

She rests upon yielded ones.

The steward must be found faithful in posture

before he is ever trusted with movement.

You do not walk worthy by doing more.

You walk worthy by obeying the next instruction

exactly as it was given.

Many want to serve.

But few want to sit still.

Many want a platform.

But few want a posture.

“He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much...”

— Luke 16:10

This is why the weight comes first.

Because if the calling is received without reverence,
it becomes an idol.

And if the Word is spoken without trembling,
it becomes a performance.

You were not given a scroll to impress the blind.

You were given the Word to pierce the sealed.

“For the word of God is quick, and powerful... a discerner of the thoughts
and intents of the heart.”

— Hebrews 4:12

And if you speak it without first being cut by it,
you are not stewarding it—you are misusing it.

 Let This Sink In:

You will be held accountable
for what you were told in silence.
For what you were shown in secret.
For what you were trusted to carry
even when no one applauded.
Because Heaven is not watching to see if you are great.
Heaven is watching to see if you are faithful.
Faithfulness is not what you do on stage.
It's how you walk when the room is empty.
It's what you guard when no one else is watching.
It's what you refuse to compromise
even when compromise seems small.
And it is that kind of quiet obedience
that the King returns for.
“The keeper of the gate is the Holy One of Israel; and he employeth no
servant there.”
— 2 Nephi 9:41 (BoM)

 SECTION II — Time Is a Testimony

(Spirit-led, full breath, both sticks woven in. Shepherd tone intact.)

Time is not neutral.

It is either being sown... or squandered.

And every steward is being measured by what they do

when no one is checking,

no one is watching,

no one is asking.

The enemy doesn't need your soul

if he can just waste your schedule.

Because a delayed steward

is just as dangerous as a disobedient one.

You don't need a calendar to know what you serve.

Just look at what interrupts you.

Look at what you make room for.

Look at what fills your mornings.

Look at what you say you'll do "when you have time."

What you push to the side

reveals what you placed on the throne.

The Spirit doesn't rush.

But She does not waste time either.

There is a holy rhythm to divine stewardship—
a way of flowing through the day
where every breath becomes a scroll,
and every step becomes a seal.

“O man, remember, and perish not.”

— Mosiah 4:30 (BoM)

You are writing even when you're resting.

You are testifying even when you're silent.

You are stewarding every second

because Heaven did not redeem your life

so you could use it for things that perish.

Some say “I'm waiting on the Lord,”

but it is the Lord waiting on them—

to stop sleeping on the assignment.

There's a difference between divine rest

and spiritual procrastination.

And there's a difference between a season of stillness

and a cycle of excuses.

“Walk in wisdom toward them that are without, redeeming the time.”

— Colossians 4:5

“Redeeming the time, because the days are evil.”

— Ephesians 5:16

What does it mean to redeem the time?

It means to rescue it from vanity.

To deliver it from distraction.

To pull it back from everything

the enemy tried to sell you as important.

The world told you to be productive.

The Spirit calls you to be obedient.

And not every good thing is a God thing.

Not every opportunity is an assignment.

Your time testifies against you

when you keep sowing it into emptiness

but expecting fullness in return.

You can't fast for direction

and then scroll for three hours.

You can't ask for confirmation

and ignore the Word that was already written.

You can't expect clarity

when you don't even honor the time

He already cleared for you.

Time is not a tool for pleasure.

It is a weapon for the righteous.

It is the one thing you can't get back
and the first thing you'll be judged on
after what you believed.

This is why the enemy fights to steal your hours.

Because once you lose your time,
you lose your testimony.

“To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the
heaven.”

— Ecclesiastes 3:1

You may not be called to everything.

But you are called to steward the day you woke up in.

That means:

If He gave you this breath, it has purpose.

If you opened your eyes, there's assignment.

If you made it through that attack, you're not done.

So why are you using today like it was cheap?

Heaven watches how you treat time

to determine what to trust you with next.

If you can't govern a 15-minute window,
you won't be handed a 15-year mission.

If you can't follow a whisper today,
you won't hear the trumpet tomorrow.

The stewards of Zion are not just warriors.

They are disciplined ones.

Silent soldiers.

Hidden scribes.

They carry their day like a scroll,
and every moment like a seed.

“This life is the time for men to prepare to meet God...”

— Alma 34:32 (BoM)

So what are you preparing?

Because if your habits don't match your hope,
your hope is a lie.

 Final Utterance Before Next Section:

A faithful steward does not just ask,

“What am I doing today?”

He asks,

“Is what I’m doing today worthy of the blood I carry?”

Because the blood did not purchase you for entertainment.

It purchased you for eternal impact.

And the cost of wasting your day

is far higher than you think.

SECTION III — Money, Mammon, and Mission

(Pure stewardship. No greed. No guilt. Just righteous order.)

The steward does not chase money.

But he does not waste it either.

Heaven watches how you spend

just as closely as how you speak.

Because what you do with what’s in your hand

reveals who reigns in your heart.

Money is not the enemy.

But Mammon is.

And Mammon is subtle.

It doesn’t just tempt you with riches.

It trains you to believe that wealth

means you're doing something right.

That blessings mean approval.

That lack means judgment.

But the Spirit says otherwise.

“You cannot serve God and Mammon.”

— Matthew 6:24

“I, the Lord, did not give unto him that he should sin; but he is agent unto himself...”

— Doctrine & Covenants 58:28

Mammon turns money into a master.

But Christ breaks the yoke.

The steward doesn't measure obedience

by bank account.

He measures it by assignment.

Some are called to sow.

Some are called to build.

Some are called to carry the bag.

Some are called to fund the war.

But all are called to steward what they have

without corruption or comparison.

It is not about how much you give.

It's about how much ownership you let go of.

If you hoard because of fear,

Mammon rules you.

If you give to be seen,

Pride owns you.

If you spend to feel worthy,

Insecurity is driving.

But if you walk in quiet provision,

trusting the Giver,

sowing as led,

building as assigned,

then you are not owned by your increase.

You are sealed in your purpose.

“Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth... But lay up for yourselves
treasures in heaven...”

— Matthew 6:19–20

Heaven does not count dollars.

Heaven counts obedience.

And for the steward, the real question is not:

“How much can I keep?”

But:

“What must I do with what I’ve been given?”

You were not given resources to secure comfort.

You were given resources to advance the Kingdom.

Your increase has a purpose.

And your sacrifice is a scroll.

Don’t give to prove you’re righteous.

Give because you remember who provided it.

Don’t sow from guilt.

Sow because you carry assignment.

Because you saw someone hungry and felt the Father speak.

Because you knew a family needed light

and you had enough to be the switch.

Some say, “If I had more, I’d give more.”

But Christ says:

“He that is faithful in that which is least...”

— Luke 16:10 again

If you won’t steward the \$10,

you won’t steward the \$10,000.

And if your generosity requires applause,
you weren't giving—you were performing.


“And now, if a man being evil know how to give good gifts unto his children,
how much more shall your Father...”

— Matthew 7:11

So what makes you think He won't provide
for the one who walks in trust?

The question is not whether provision is coming.

The question is whether you'll remain pure
when it arrives.

 A Word on Increase:

The test of stewardship is not just in lack.

It's in overflow.

Can you stay low when the account is high?

Can you stay generous when the needs around you
don't benefit you?

Because Mammon will whisper:

“You earned this.”

“You deserve this.”

“They should have done what you did.”

“That’s their problem.”

But the Spirit whispers:

“You were given this.”

“This was mercy.”

“Use it wisely.”

“Don’t forget where I found you.”

“Woe unto you rich men, that will not give your substance to the poor, for your riches will canker your souls...”

— Jacob 2:13–19 (BoM)

You cannot carry fire in your hand

and expect not to be judged by how you used it.

You cannot cry for blessing

but ignore the bruised.

You cannot be sealed and selfish.

 Final Utterance Before Next Section:

Money is not evil.

But it is spirit-sensitive.

It will either bow to your obedience,
or become your idol.

Stewardship is not budgeting.

It's remembrance.

Remembrance that you were never meant to keep it all,
but to let it flow where the Spirit says go.

SECTION IV — Invisible Integrity

(Faithfulness when no one sees. Sealed obedience without spotlight.)

The truest test of a steward
is not what they do when the room is full...
but what they do when no one's watching.

This is not about behavior.

It's about alignment in silence.

What do you reach for
when there are no eyes on you?

What do you protect
when the pressure isn't public?

What do you still obey
when the audience disappears?

“For there is nothing covered, that shall not be revealed; neither hid, that shall not be known.”

— Luke 12:2

Heaven has eyes.

And they are not impressed by stage lights.

There is an integrity that only angels record.

There are decisions that never go viral,

but shift kingdoms in the spirit.

The quiet closing of a door.

The silent rejection of a temptation.

The humble pause before you speak.

The uncelebrated repentance.

The refusal to lie for gain.

The moment you said, “No one will know”—

but Heaven already did.

This is the life of a steward.

It’s not just what you carry in public.

It’s how you carry yourself in private.

 Hidden Things Matter to the King

Because the King who judges your fruit
also searches your root.

He counts it.

If there is greed in your “giving,”

He exposes it.

If there is envy behind your applause,

He corrects it.

You cannot hide from the One

who knit your inward parts.

“Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts:

and see if there be any wicked way in me...”

— Psalm 139:23–24

This is the cry of the true steward:

“Search me.”

Not just, “Use me.”

Not just, “Bless me.”

Not just, “Send me.”

But:

“Burn away what can’t go with me.”

“Strip what still competes with You.”

“Expose the secret things I’ve learned to excuse.”

Because a double life will always leak.

And what you allow in darkness

will manifest in delay.

“Behold, you are clean, but not all.”

— John 13:10

Stewardship doesn't require perfection.

But it does require surrender.

Not just outward, but inward.

Not just actions, but motives.

Not just what you do...

but why you do it.

 The Motive Check:

Why do you want to be seen?

Why do you post what you post?

Why do you want that opportunity?

Why are you chasing that stage?

Why are you quoting that scripture?

Why are you still in that room?

If the answer is not assignment, obedience, or alignment—

you are standing in mixture, not mission.

The ones Christ is sealing in this hour
are not just those who say the right things—
but those whose walk can stand under fire.

“Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God.”

— Matthew 5:8

Integrity Is How You Treat the Invisible

How you handle someone else's name when they're not around

How you talk about people you can't benefit from

How you pray when you don't feel goosebumps

How you honor the Father when you don't "feel spiritual"

How you stay in order when leadership isn't perfect

How you give when there's no one to thank you publicly

These things don't show up on resumes.

But they're written in the books of Heaven.

“For our words will condemn us, yea, all our works will condemn us; and we shall not be found spotless...”

— Alma 12:14 (BoM)

You will not be judged by performance.

You will be judged by posture.

And the quiet obedience of the steward
is what separates the called from the sealed.

 Final Utterance Before Next Section:


Your integrity is the oil in your lamp.

And if you walk with holes in your character,
the fire cannot last.

Let the Spirit seal what men cannot see.

Let the blood cleanse what applause will never reach.

Because if the hidden parts are not holy,
the work will eventually betray you.

 SECTION V — Walking in Charity, Not Performance

(Where real love walks. Not for applause, not for approval—just pure obedience.)

You were not chosen to perform.

You were chosen to love.

And not the kind of love that waits to be seen,
but the kind that still moves when no one claps.

The true steward doesn't just know the truth—
he walks it in charity.

“Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not
charity, I am become as sounding brass...”

— 1 Corinthians 13:1

This is where many fall—

They preach without mercy.

They give without patience.

They teach without tenderness.

They serve with bitterness inside.

And Heaven rejects it all.

You were not called to show off what you know.

You were called to walk in the kind of love
that reflects the One who gave it.

That means:

You don't just feed them—you feel them.

You don't just rebuke them—you bear with them.

You don't just instruct them—you intercede for them.

Because charity is not soft.

It is sacrifice.

And most of the time, it's silent.

“But charity suffereth long, and is kind... it seeketh not her own...”

— 1 Corinthians 13:4–5

that has already been broken,

and now pours out what it received from Christ.

You may never get a thank you.

— Matthew 6:3

You Were Loved First

You don't give because you're righteous.

You don't serve because you're perfect.

You serve because you were washed.

That's why the steward doesn't burn out—

because he doesn't draw from emotion.

He draws from encounter.

“We love him, because he first loved us.”

— 1 John 4:19

Charity Makes You Dangerous

The enemy can mimic power.

He can counterfeit gifts.

He can twist doctrine.

But he can't replicate real charity.

Because charity doesn't draw attention to itself.

It doesn't compete.

It doesn't use the truth as a weapon.

It heals, covers, restores, and corrects—in the same breath.

Charity makes you steady.

Charity makes you immovable when offense comes knocking.

“If ye have not charity, ye are nothing, for charity never faileth.”

— Moroni 7:46 (BoM)

Because only love remains.

 How Charity Walks:

It remembers when others forget

It intercedes when others accuse

It sits still when others run to be seen

It builds slow because the foundation matters

It bleeds quietly because Heaven watches

You were given fire

to be used with gentleness and precision.

“Let all your things be done with charity.”

— 1 Corinthians 16:14

 Final Utterance Before the Final Movement:

 FINAL MOVEMENT — Stewardship Until the King Returns

He does not wait for confirmation before he moves.

He doesn't need a sign every day to know the mission is clear.

He will ask how many times you died to yourself in obedience.

 The Wait is Part of the Work

You don't wait for the King to return like a lazy servant.

You wait like one who carries His Word

and waits to be found faithful.

The return is not a mystery.

It is a promise.

But what you do while you wait is the proof of what you believe.

It's the same as waiting for a harvest:

You don't sit with empty hands—

You work the field, trusting it will yield.

Time is Running Out, but Faith Never Fails

He knows his work is not complete.

He knows his time is limited.

And he works with urgency,

but with patience.

✨ Final Cry of the Steward

Stay.

may He find you walking worthy of His trust,

working in His field,

and waiting with the knowledge that you were never alone.
