Stand Firm

"The Warrior does not fight to build the Kingdom. He stands faithfully within the Kingdom the King is building."

The Mantle

The Kingdom has always required courageous people.

Not men who sought violence...

But men who refused to abandon the covenant.

The Warrior stands when others retreat.

He remains faithful when trials arise.

He protects the weak.

He defends the truth.

He endures suffering without surrendering his obedience to the King.

James bore this witness in the East.

Kumen bore this witness in the West.

Together they testify that true strength is measured by faithfulness, not force.

East Witness — James

James, the son of Zebedee, walked closely with the Messiah.

He witnessed miracles.

He heard the Master's teaching.

He remained faithful through seasons of joy and seasons of persecution.

When opposition came, James did not abandon Christ.

Acts 12:1–2

"Now about that time Herod the king stretched forth his hands to vex certain of the church.

And he killed James the brother of John with the sword."

James became the first of the Twelve Apostles to lay down his life for the Kingdom.

His greatest weapon was never a sword.

It was unwavering faith.

The Messiah had prepared James for this calling long before.

Mark 10:38–39

"Can ye drink of the cup that I drink of?... Ye shall indeed drink of the cup that I drink of..."

The Warrior accepts the cost of discipleship.

He follows the King wherever the path leads.

West Witness — Kumen

The resurrected Messiah chose Kumen as one of His twelve disciples among the Nephites.

3 Nephi 19:4

"And it came to pass that Nephi went down into the multitude, and took the names of those whom the Lord had commanded that they should bring..."

Kumen answered the Master's call.

He accepted the responsibility of serving the covenant people.

The disciples were then commissioned to continue the work.

3 Nephi 18:36

"And it came to pass that when Jesus had made an end of these sayings, he touched with his hand the disciples whom he had chosen..."

The Warrior does not seek recognition.

He seeks faithfulness.

His reward is found in serving the King.

One Testimony

James remained faithful unto death.

Kumen remained faithful unto service.

Different lands.

Different generations.

One King.

One covenant.

One testimony.

Both witnesses reveal that courage is not measured by earthly victories.

It is measured by steadfast obedience.

Shield of Faith

Ephesians 6:16
